

Dear Uncle Grinshew.

Herewith the answers such as they are. There is only one well in the orchard.



left of base of waterfall & covered by a stone slab (loose). As it is on the far side of the stream, it will now be in Mr. Wall's property. It is fed by a spring somewhere on the hill & is pure and was the supply to Middle manor and the farm. Now all mains water except as drawing.

This was the supply to the house as used by us. A small hand-pump was inside the kitchen. The visible drain grid goes on to Lower Manoy, outlet unknown.

However, somewhere (position unknown) there is a branch to the pipe, probably under the orchard, going to the small building in the Dods' farmyard, in which he houses his dogs (formerly a dairy). The water there is still used and always running.

Any collapse or leakage of the pipes would not affect you but it would be on your property.

So far as I remember, the Wash house drain does not go into the main sewer, but into the old surface water drain, outlet unknown, but on Mr. Wells property.

There is no mains water supply to the barn and land above the Nook, as such. You will see a nylon pipe in the Wash-house, coupled to a tap which can be disconnected and was done by me for my own convenience on my (Linen) own property. I always found Mr. Brooks & Mr. Wells very reasonable men and this could be sorted between you at no cost.

Re drains, since all surface water & drains unknown point up on Lower manor farm I suggest your solicitor tries to sort out soon

arrangement with Mr. Wells' solicitor.
Everything is so old & vague that hard & fast
rules cannot be made.
e.g. the path at the back of the rear wall
of Middlemanor does not belong to anybody.
Through usage the people of Howor manor have
established a right-of-way, but neither house
owns it & the S. Hams council say it is not
their responsibility for maintenance. The lane
between walls fell down some years ago
through the heavy traffic going to build the
sewage works. It was rebuilt by Mr. Wells,
the contractor himself, each paying £3d.
Both properties are very insanitary &
some fence and gates on all sides is necessary.
This all sounds trivial but a
good neighbourly atmosphere is essential.
All help further is appreciated.
