PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting on 25 October was mainly concerned with an application to site five caravans at Lewer Maner Farm. After a very full discussion, it was decided to eppose the application - which will be decided by the Camping and Caravan Club - on the fellowing grounds: -

Ringmere is one of the few unspeiled villages left in the South Hams. It is a Conservation Area, yet it already has to suffer the heavy tourist traffic to and from

Challaberough Heliday Camp.

In addition to Challaborough, there is already ample provision for touring caravans and tents at Belle Vue Farm, Ringmore, which has not been full at any time during the past three years. During this period, three new caravan sites have opened in the near vicinity.

From the sea, Challaborough Samp is an eyescre. It would be a tragedy if the valley next to it, which leads from Ayrmer Cove to Lower Maner Farm, were to lose its

peaceful, rural appearance.

The Lane giving access to Lower Manor Farm would be totally unsuitable for caravans. A recent application for a housing development along this lane was rejected, largely because of the unsuitable access. Already, with the existing traffic, there is a history of damage to walls, window sills and perches by wide farm vehicles and of traffic blockages.

Visiters, including many with children, walk down the lane to Ayrmer Cove. Many comment on its peace and charm, which would be destroyed by an increase in traffic. Mcreover, wide vehicles, such as caravans, are a hazard to pedestrians in Country Lanes.
