PARISH COUNCIL

Planning: The Parish Council has considered an application to replace the Dolphin Cafe at Challaborough with a larger Beach Cafe and three flats above this. It was felt that such a massive building would be too dominant - especially when viewed from the Bigbury side of the bay. It would also be too close to the private house, which adjoined the old Dolphin Cafe. Moreover if, as was thought likely, the aim of the camp owners was to attract additional visitors from outside the camp, there would be problems for car parking and an increase in the already excessive weekend traffic along the lanes leading to Challaborough. For these reasons, the application was opposed and the District Council's attention was drawn to several inaccurate and unsatisfactory features of the plan as drawn. It was felt that planning applications, relating to the Holiday Camp, could be dealt with more satisfactorily if the Parish Council was given an overall picture of planned developments at Challaborough. Planning applications for an additional bedroom at Ivy Cottage, Ringmore and for additional first floor flats at Gralander, Challaborough has been supported by the Parish Council but not yet approved by the District Council. The District Council has approved the erection of new farm buildings for Lower Manor Farm, subject to a number of conditions relating to access, drainage and landscaping. The conversion of a barn at Lower Manor Farm into three residential units has also been approved in outline, subject to a large number of conditions.

No date has yet been fixed for consideration, by the Department of Environment Inspector, of the appeal against refusal of planning consent for a site above Rocky Path. No decision has yet been made by the District Council on the application to build a bungalow in the garden of "Tosca", which was strongly opposed by the Parish Council. No detailed plans have yet been received by the Parish Council for the proposed conversion of the basement at "Old Castle", or any information about car parking arrangements for the proposed new flats. The orchard behind the "Journey's End" has been sold by auction to two separate purchasers. The Parish Council drew the attention of the District Council planners to the misleading advertisement for this auction, which claimed that the sites had outline planning permission for 4 bedroomed, 2 bathroom dwellings with double garages. The Planning Officer has confirmed that, in fact, <u>all</u> aspects of the detailed plans for the sites are still matters for discussion and agreement.

Trees: It is hoped that the Parish Council will again be able to obtain free trees from Devon County Council, for planting next December. Anyone willing to plant native trees on their land and to care for them should contact Mrs. Ardene Bennett (Tel. 810398) before the end of August. The trees available will probably be the same as last year i.e. Ash, Lime, Beech, Oak, Sweet Chestnut, Sycamore, Willow, Alder, Hornbeam, Birch, Wild Cherry, Whitebeam, Poplar, Field Maple and Rowan.

Friday Bus: The Chairman of the Parish Council has protested to Western National about the replacement of the normal Friday Bus by a small Hopper, during the school holidays. A promise has been made that the normal bus will be restored immediately.

<u>Jetski</u>: The Parish Council is concerned about the lack of control over the new jetskiing activities at Challaborough. This could be dangerous for swimmers and surfers, as well as for the jet-skiers themselves. There is also a lack of changing facilities into and out of wet suits - and the public toilet is being used for this purpose.

Fire Hydrant put on Map: Mr. Tom Woodall, the Parish Road Sweeper, has found a fire hydrant, which was unmarked and unknown to the fire authorities. As a result of his representations, the hydrant has now been properly marked.


