PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Clerk: Our present Parish Clerk, Mrs. Valerie Belsey, will be moving to Totnes in November and will have to relinquish the post. Anyone interested in taking on the job is invited to contact the Parish Council Chairman, Mr. Guy Eddy. It must be pointed out that this is not a career opportunity, but the work can be quite interesting and is absolutely essential to the running of the Parish Council - and there is some remuneration.

Site above Rocky Path: The appeal to the Department of the Environment, against rejection of the application to build above Rocky Path, will be heard at 10.00 a.m. on Tuesday 11 October, at Follaton House, Totnes. Interested members of the public may attend, if they wish to do so.

The District Council has rejected the application to build in the garden of Tosca: "Tosca", because of the limitations of pedestrian and vehicular access, resulting in an excessive loss of privacy for the residents of "Tosca". Also because "the site is situated within the South Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and the proposed development would be detrimental to the character and appearance of the area where there is a presumption against new development except where this is necessary to the economic or social well being of the area or where it will enhance its character, neither of which criteria are applicable in this case."

The District Council has also rejected the application to Gralanda, Challaborough: build two additional flats over the new shop at the Challacott Centre. The main reason for this refusal is the presumption against new development in an A.O.N.B., as in the case of "Tosca" Additional objections are:-

"The site falls within a Coastal Preservation Area within which the Local Planning Authority will normally only permit certain development, as identified in the County Structure Plan. The proposal is not one of these and therefore is contrary to that plan. The proposal comprises overdevelopment of the site resulting in a form of development out of scale with existing buildings and detrimental to the appearance of the locality".

The owners of the new shop at the Challacott Centre have applied for a licence to retail intoxicating liquor. The Parish Council is opposed to this application, because past experience has shown that the local retailing of spirits encourages rowdy drinking parties on the beach.

Untidy Conditions at Challaborough Camp: The Parish Council has received complaints from visitors about the dirty and untidy condition of Challaborough beach, compared with the position in previous years. It is hoped that there will shortly be a meeting with the owners of the camp to discuss this and other matters, including the re-design of the building which is to replace the old Dolphin Cafe. The application to erect a very large building on this site was withdrawn following opposition at local and district levels.

<u>Public Telephone</u>: Mr. McCabe has kindly volunteered to keep a daily check on the public telephone in Ringmore village, as part of the Telecom Watch-a-box scheme. Participants in this scheme have been invited to nominate an environmental project, for possible support, and the Parish Council has suggested the re-furbishing of the bus shelter. The Parish Council is to ask for the old red telephone box to be retained, unstead of being replaced by a modern box.

Public Toilet at Challaborough: As an economy measure, the District Council proposes to close the public toilet in the winter months. If anyone objects to this, they should inform the Parish Council, giving reasons, so that a case can be made for keeping the toilet open.

Jet Ski-ing at Challaborough: Complaints about the operation of jet skis are still being received. The skis are now keeping within the boat lane, but they are often abusing this by using it as a training area, instead of a means of access to deep water. Complaints have been made to the Harbour Master about this and about infringements of the bye-laws concerning water ski-ing on the Avon. It is hoped that more staff will be provided next August to enforce the regulations.

RINGMORE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Society has had two very interesting outings - <u>Compton Castle</u> proved to have all the historical atmosphere and flavour of a Devon fortified Manor home with the added attraction of a charming well kept garden and a very convenient car park. A flavour of a different sort proved equally popular when we followed up our Castle visit with a scrumptious cream tea provided by our friends at Brambridge Farm.

The other visit was closer to home at Leigh Barton when Francis Kelly Inspector of Ancient Monuments and Historic Buildings of English Heritage took us round the Barton and showed us the latest Archaeological developments of the team who had worked through the summer. On this occasion we were joined by members from Kingston and Modbury History Societies. It was very informal and Francis Kelly was delightfully open to suggestions and ideas of the assembled amateurs.

Anyone wanting to join a party to Buckland Abbey on Wednesday 14 September should give their name to one of the Officers of our Society quickly.

<u>ROADFORD RESERVOIR</u> which is just WEST of the LAUNCESTON-OKEHAMPTON ROAD not far from LIFTON is at a very interesting and quite spectacular stage of its development. It will be the third and largest of the S.W. Waterboard's projects and will provide all the water required for some years to come.

As well as the dam itself there are historical villages which are being excavated by the Devon Archaeological Society before the water drowns the sites.

All this is close to <u>Bratton Clovelly</u> which has an interesting Church with remarkable wall paintings which are being carefully restored. This is an all day programme. If anyone would be interested to visit these places on Saturday 24 September and would commit themselves to the outing please give your name to one of our officers not later than 14 Sept. Arrangements <u>cannot</u> be made at very short notice. It could be a good family outing for those with older young people.

MAPS. The Society has purchased a set of large scale maps of Ringmore Parish dated 1886 and also a large scale map covering the Sale of Leaseholds of the Manor of Ringmore of 1863. These with the Tithe Map of 1841 show the development of the "Town" of Ringmore and its satellite "villages" - These may be seen by <u>members</u> at Middle Manor by appointment with the chairman.

The next committee meeting is on Wednesday 2 November at Middle Manor at 7.30 p.m.

DEVON COUNTY COUNCIL ACCESSIBILITY STUDY

Improved Local Transport In Prospect! Devon County Council will be coming into three areas of rural Devon in September and October to carry out a Study of access to vital facilities. The aim is to assess how well the present levels of transport availability (both private and public), provides the answer to gaining access to services required by the general public and then to introduce new services to test out the conclusion on the ground.

However, in order to do this, a large scale house - to - house survey will have to be carried out by a team of interviewers led by Miss Nila Patel. If you are a resident in one of these areas, do not be surprised if you receive an introductory letter through the post explaining the project, a brief questionnaire (which they would like you to fill in an soon as possible), along with a pre-paid envelope. Further surveying will be carried out shortly afterwards.

The success of this survey is totally reliant on the survey work. All answers will be treated in the strictest confidence and in the one - to - one household survey there is no need to give your name and address.

- i) Zeal Monachorum
- Woolfardisworthy, Kennerleigh, Poughill, Stockleigh English, Cheriton Fitzpaine, Cadeleigh and Cadbury.
- iii) Kingston, Ringmore, Bigbury, Modbury, Ermington, Holbeton and Ugborough.


