PONY SOCIETY

Once again I would like to thank anyone who helped, gave and came to my coffee morning run by the Devon Branch of the National Pony Society you all helped us to raise £900 for Devon Hospice Care. Over the last six years we have raised more than £4,000 for Devon Charities, £2,550 over the last three years. The monies raised up to now have

gone to Hospice Care, Age Concern, Guide Dog for the Blind, the Children's Ward at Wonford Hospital, and Riding for the Disabled. This year we are hoping to raise at least £1,000 for Exeters Royal School for the Deaf, the money to go to the Deaf and Blind Childrens Section. We raise our money by running four functions a year, Spring and Summer Horse Shows, a pate and plonk evening and my Coffee Morning which next year, 1989, I am having on 7 September, also we run a lottery. A lot of the money raised at the Horse Shows is through people sponsoring our classes at £15 a time. All the names of the sponsors and addresses are printed in our schedules which are sent out all over the country; (400 at our summer show this year) so if anyone would like to sponsor a class especially those with a business, we would be most grateful. PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Clerk: Following the resignation of Mrs. Valerie Belsey, who has moved to Totnes, the Parish Council has appointed Mrs. Rosemary Tate, of Cross Park Ringmore, as Clerk.

Donations: The Parish Council has decided to donate £80 to the Parish Church, for the upkeep of the churchyard, and £10 to the Cuckworthy Museum.

Watch-A-Box Scheme: In the two months since Mr. McCabe started to make a daily check of the telephone box in Ringmore village, the telephone has been out of action only once - for two days. Moreover, several residents have commented on the improved condition of the telephone box.

Challaborough: Mr. Carter and Mr. Miller - the owner and manager of Challaborough Bay Holiday Centre - attended the November meeting of the Parish Council to discuss their plans for the Camp. They assured the Council that their policy is to improve the camp, slowly but surely. Plans for the replacement of the Dolphin Cafe have been re-submitted to the district Council and there is to be a new sound-proofed and air-conditioned Entertainment Centre on the site of the supermarket, adjacent to the Beach Bar. Consideration is being given to the purchase of a machine to clean the beach and screening trees will be planted, within the camp, this winter.

Mr. Sercombe has undertaken to try to find out the extent of the district Council's responsibility for the cleaning of Challaborough beach.

The Parish Council is to enquire whether it is still intended to plant shrubs on the new slope behind the challacott Centre.

The owners of the new shop at the Challacott Centre are to appeal to the Department of the Environment, against the District Council's rejection of their proposal to build two additional flats over their shop.

The request for a licence to sell intoxicating liquor at the Top Shop has been withdrawn.

Site above Rocky Path: An appeal against refusal of planning permission, for a bungalow in the old Journey's End garden, above Rocky Path, was heard by a Department of Environment Planning Inspector on 11 October. After very detailed consideration, he refused the appeal, because of the adverse effect of the proposal on the village and Conservation Area, and because of the inadequate road network leading past the appeal site.

Old Castle: An application to convert the basement of Old Castle to living accommodation has been approved by the District Council.

Cross Manor: The building of a new porch and study, with a natural slate roof and rendered walls, at Cross Manor has been approved by the Parish Council.

Barns at South Langstone: The Parish Council has also approved a proposal to convert the redundant barns at South Langstone into dwellings.

Meetings at District Council Level: On 14 November Mr. Eddy and Mr. McCabe will attend a meeting of Parish and Town Council representatives and, on 15 November Miss Trueman and Mrs. Bennett will attend a meeting on the protection of our environment.

HONEY CRUNCH BISCUITS

2 oz granulated sugar
2 oz butter
2 oz plain flour

1 tablespoon honey
3 oz rolled oats
1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

Melt the butter and honey together, take off heat and add bicarbonate of soda. In a bowl put flour, oats and sugar, mix in the liquid mixture and allow to cool slightly. Put knobs of mixture on to a greased baking sheet and flatten slightly. Bake at 325 F - 350 F or gas 4 for approx. 35 minutes.

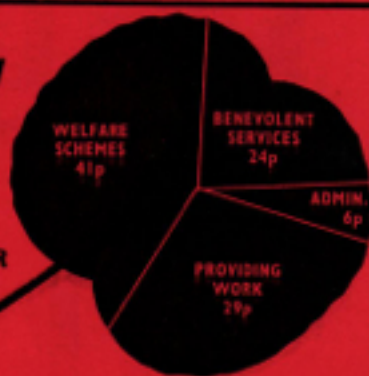

The Poppy Appeal helps ex-Service people and their dependants when they are in need. That's some 8 million men and women with 10 million dependants – about one third of the entire population. This help is offered to ex-Service people through the Royal British Legion whether they are members of the Legion or not, regardless of when they served in the forces.

NATIONWIDE WELFARE AND RELIEF

We helped over 75,000 people last year.

- We cared for 291 in our 5 residential homes, and 3,435 in our 3 convalescent homes.
- We gave increased allowances to 4,372 permanently incapacitated ex-Service people and widows.
- We made grants to other Ex-Service Charities, and hope to help a similar number of people this year.

LOCAL WELFARE SERVICES

Welfare Committees of 3,354 Legion Branches operate a local advice and welfare service.

- They provide extra fuel for the elderly in winter.
- They help families in crisis.
- They visit the long-term sick.
- They arrange holidays for the convalescent.
- They initiate pension schemes and give advice on them.

PENSION ADVICE

We dealt with over 17,860 war pension cases last year. Constant pressure on the government has helped increase war pensions in line with inflation, but we continue to seek remedies for social injustices still affecting ex-Service people.

HOUSING

Our self-supporting Housing Association now houses 18,000 people. More homes are planned or under construction throughout the UK during 1988.



PROVIDING WORK

We gave sheltered employment or training to 1,660 disabled people last year (More than any other private employer), and made grants or loans of over £697,000 to our sheltered industries.

- Our self-supporting services provide 910 uniformed attendants and a disciplined security force.
- We give advice and loans to ex-Service people starting up small businesses.

TRAINING TAXI DRIVERS

Since 1946, 5,367 London taxi-drivers – one in three – have been trained and licensed by our taxi school.

PILGRIMAGES

We organise regular pilgrimages for widows and loved ones to visit war graves

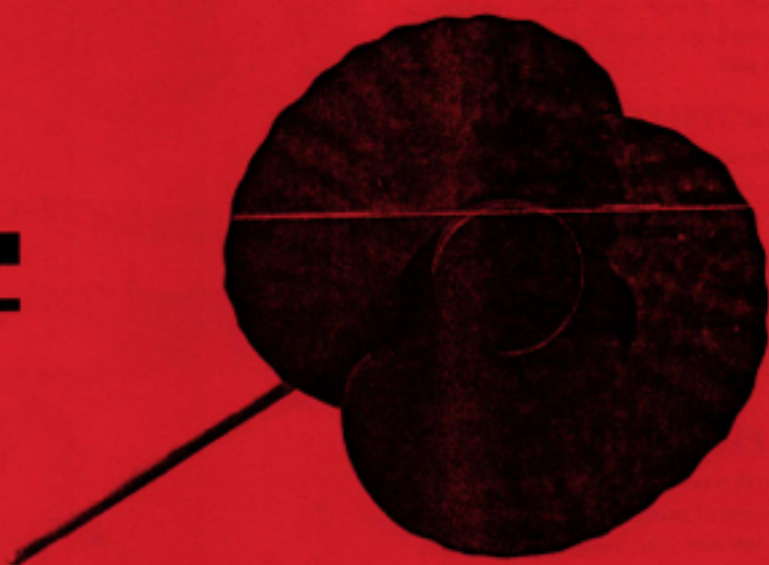
