
#### Ken Ward's Memories of South Devon 1940

One afternoon my Batman came to see me to say that two civilians were being held in a small car on the beach road. The couple appeared to have a marked OS map and should not have been there. I went along and found a man and a woman with an OS 1" map with markings which, to my knowledge, seemed to coincide with various lookout points. I told them that they were out of bounds and the man said to me, "You cannot order me about. I am an adjutant in the British Union of Fascists. I am looking for an acquaintance who lives at a farm called ......, near here.". So I kept his map and told

him how to get to the farm which was down a dead-end lane, not far away. I then rang I Corps who asked me to block the road until they could get there. This we did with our three tonner. Security arrived and we left them to it. Later I was thanked and told that they had collected several undesirable characters.

After five or six months, the powers-that-be decided we were needed back at our unit so we were replaced by a WRAF team. During our stay we had maintained a continuous watch 24 hours a day and had certainly provided useful information which helped to account for some E Boats. We were sorry to leave for a more energetic time and army cooking!



This was the final instalment in Ken Ward's recollections of his war-time in the South Hams. We are grateful to him for having taken the trouble to record them and also to Reg Trant for having submitted them. We hope

that you enjoyed reading these stories.


The Hospice is most grateful and advises us that care has been given to an increased number of patients this year and occupational therapy has been provided. Hopefully, physiotherapy is to be considered.

(excerpts from the minutes of the October Meeting)

#### Driving Speeds Down in Devon

The proposed talk by Daniel McCarthy has been postponed until the November meeting.

#### Trees

#### Road Signs

The subject of road signs down to the Journey's End was discussed. It was agreed that existing signs are adequate if of dubious legality. The lane from Cumberland Cottages to Challaborough Cottage is a public Highway. No further action is proposed.

#### Large Delivery Vehicles

The undesirability of such vehicles passing through Ringmore was considered. It was agreed to write to commercial concerns attracting these vehicles to see what could be done to improve matters, e.g. request that suppliers use smaller vehicles or arrange collection from alternative drop-off sites. Replies are to be requested and the situation will be reviewed further as necessary.

#### Skips

In March '96 there will be a single skip in Ringmore. The Challaborough facility has regrettably been lost for the present. This is unsatisfactory and will be monitored.

#### Flooding

The problem at Cumberland Cottages remains unresolved. Actual responsibility for the offending drain is blurred but hopefully, by the November meeting, matters will be clarified.

District Councillor Roger Ansty gave a useful and informative report regarding the Structure Plan. He stressed that no site has been identified yet for the 'new town'. Sufficient copies of 'Devon 2011' have been obtained to supply each household in the Parish and these will be delivered with the November Newsletter. Thanks are due to Tesco for the supply.



#### HOKY POKY BISCUITS

A great hit at chidren's parties!

4 oz Margarine

4 oz Sugar

8 ozs Plain Flour

1 dessertspoon milk

1 dessertspoon Golden Syrup

1small teaspoon bircarbonate of soda

Cream the margarine and sugar together until light. Warm the milk & syrup together, then add the bicarbonate of soda. Stir this mixture into the creamed margarine & sugar. Add the flour and mix well. Roll heaped teaspoonsful of the mixture in the hands and flatten slightly with a fork. Place on lightly oiled baking sheets and bake at 300 F/gas 2/150C until golden. Cool before storing in airtight tin.

### Grand Gift Fair



## Ringmore Parish Newsletter

You will have seen from the notes on the last Parish Council meeting that the Newsletter is under discussion. Anyone who has produced a newsletter of any sort will know there are three elements to a successful issue:

- Sufficient interesting content
- Sufficient funds to cover production
- Successful distribution



Content and Distribution are not under discussion at the moment. It is the costs which are occupying the minds of our councillors.

Cost is an important consideration. If you just throw money at a problem then alternatives are never considered. The volume of content dictates cost to some extent as does the extent to which cost can be defrayed by revenue. The Newsletter charges advertisers £12 per year for a monthly advert. This has not changed for a number of years but is still somewhat higher than the figure charged by neighbouring parishes. In addition to that, regular contributors pay a sum which equates to the production cost (paper and photocopying) of the space which they use. The current situation is that the Newsletter is running at an annual deficit of about £100 per year. This deficit has been growing as production costs inevitably increase. The village shop charges a fair rate for reproduction, better than most print shops in the area. Those sources which are less expensive might not always be so, are not in the village and are therefore less accessible and less convenient.

It is possible to keep the cost of the Newsletter within the revenue received by limiting each issue to an average of four and a half sides throughout the year, which would allow space for the advertisers and the regular contributors only. Every side over 41/2 costs money unless everyone is asked to pay the real cost of the space used. For example the space taken by the Enigma puzzle costs approximately £1 each month. Smaller items obviously cost less but should there be a charge for them or should they be free? Should every house be asked to pay £1 per year which will almost wipe out the deficit? What if someone refuses to pay? Should they still receive a copy? Should the cost be borne from the Parish Council's annual Precept (the sum raised from the Parish for the PC by the SHDC)? These are the questions faced by the Council. It has, in the past, made good the shortfall but it has not been, hitherto, a large amount. If you have an opinion, let one of your Parish Councillors know what it is before they meet to consider how to deal with the problem at the November meeting. If the weight of opinion says 'we don't want a newsletter', then the decision is easy but if you do want it to continue as more than just a report of the activities of the village organisations, let it be known. The council is rightly wary of spending money unnecessarily, some might say frivilously, and therefore it needs to know what you think.
