The WI and the Church both raised record figures and almost £250 was donated at Maple Bank. Brian Stark's generosity in providing Adrian Muller with a strimmer has meant that others can benefit from the proceeds of an enjoyable afternoon of 'meeting and eating'.

Last month, a typographical error regarding the tending of Town Well caused the telphone lines to buzz. Comments have been made about others, who were not named, who have looked after this area in the past but consistency of information is not found, even from those who have raised the topic. What is certain however, is that the Village is grateful to all who have spent time and energy on keeping Town Well, the Bowling Green, the Bus Shelter and other parts of the Parish in order, in the past and at present. As anyone who has ever been involved in similar activities, it is not done for the reward.

The Bus Survey did produce a ripple of response and thanks are due to those who returned the slips. The results appear elsewhere and perhaps the volume of comment is a measure of need. Hazel Freeman kindly took the trouble to write some interesting remarks. Hazel has used the bus for 25 years and now, more often than not, is the only traveller from the village on the 87A. Very few people are picked up from Challaborough as it is easier for them to make the short walk to Bigbury-on-Sea to catch the regular service. The demand does not seem to be there which is unfortunate for those who would use a service on a regular or frequent basis. Even in Kingston only 2 people are collected regularly, notwithstanding the fact that a substantial number of people signed the petition for the diversion . The information will be passed to the Parish Council for them to use as they see fit.

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

TEN YEARS AGO.

The Newsletter format changed from Foolscap to A4 and the method of replication changed from Roneo to Photo-copying. For students of history: Foolscap or to give it its full name,

Foolscap Folio, measured 13½"x8½" or, for the very young, 343mm x 216mm. Foolscap was a modular measurement, Folio being double Fodlscap Octavo and quadruple Foolscap Quarto. The name Foolscap derived from the watermark. Roneo was a process for producing a printed page from a stencii cut on a typewriter. The stencil was placed on a roller in a machine not unlike a mangle and as it passed across a sheet of plain paper, ink was forced through the stencil. It was very messy! A mangle was

Ringmore Historical Society

Mrs Joan Teverson, who has a long association with Ringmore, has kindly sent us her memories of the period during which her family has been associated with those enigmatically named cottages, End and Inner Bohemia and others around Ringmore. Such detail, gleaned from living memory, is vitally important in the work of recording the history of the village. From writings like this, a comprehensive account of the past can be assembled. The RHS is most grateful to Mrs Teverson for having taken the time to put pen to paper and we hope that it is of interest to everyone. If anyone else has knowledge of a particular place or event which has yet to be recorded, please write it down today - tomorrow could be too late! - and send it to the Chairman, George Grimshaw at Middle Manor.

End Bohemia and Inner Bohemia

The two cottages were bought by my Grandfather Thomas Leddra in 1915 or 1916 from a man called Wellington, at Ocean Hill¹. They were already named Inner and End Bohemia and I have know idea why they were so called. They were rated as one cottage until they were separated in about 1970. The next owners were my Grandmother Elizabeth Leddra, my father and then my mother. My mother gave them to my sister, Mary Harper, and myself, jointly. We split them up around 1970. Until this time we shared an outside toilet and a communicating door between the two kitchens which was only recently plastered over on our side (End Bohemia). The door remained on the other side in Inner Bohemia but this may now be different. In 1993 I passed the ownership of End Bohemia to my son Robin Teverson. Inner Bohemia had been passed on to my neice, Helen and she sold the cottage in 1993.

Around 1980, we had the front door of End Bohemia moved from its direct access from lounge to street. The road outside is very narrow and the porch was always being knocked by passing caravans and lorries, etc.. We were glad to move the front door to where it is now, in the kitchen extension leading into an entrance hall. We put the toilet and shower in at the back of the cottage where the back door and kitchen had been. There is now no back door and the stairs lead up from this room. The original toilets were in the sheds at the bottom of the garden which are now used for garden tools. The inner Bohemia shed is now on End Bohemia land and a new wooden one was put up in the 1980's, so End Bohemia has three garden sheds.

We had the electricity installed in the 1930's². I think it cost £4.10.0d (£4.50p for those too young to be yet a part of history!) for the wiring of the place. The water³ and drainage⁴ came after the war. We had to get the water from Rock Cottage until then. The pump was on the rock there. If that ran dry, as it did at times, we had to go down to a tap near the Inn (Town Well).

My Grandparents were the first visitors in our family to the village and they stayed with their family, with Bessie Ryder in the cottage next to Rock Cottage (Rose Cottage). My Grandparents had four children; Morris (my father), Ralph, Nellie and Claude who spent a lot of time there. Later my Aunt lived in Rock Cottage for years. My Grandfather, Uncle Ralph and Uncle Claude also owned Rose Cottage. My Aunt moved to Cypress Cottage (now named Smugglers' Cottage). Later on and we always called the lane, from her cottage to Ayrmer, by the name of Auntie Nellie's Lane. We also had two boathouses down at Challaborough, one long since gone, with the fall of the cliff. Two Great Aunts lived down there in two bungalows, on the way up to Bigbury-on-Sea.

In the early days my Grandparents and their family came to Ringmore by pony and trap or the carrier's van from Plymouth. I can remember doing this, as a small child. I have been told that my Grandfather walked back to Plymouth at the end of the weekend when his family was on holiday in the village. We always spent all our school summer holidays at the cottage and my cousins did the same - they were good days. My son Robin has a cannon ball which we dug out of the cottage hedge.

When my Mother took over the two cottages in the 1930's, Inner Bohemia was let for 2/- (10p) a week to a member of the Bardens family and he was a fisherman. Later, my sister and I shared the thatched cottage, Inner Bohemia, and let End Bohemia. Refugees from London lived in End Bohemia during the war.

My family and various cottages

Inner and End Bohemia: The owners were Thomas Leddra, Bessie Leddra, Morris Leddra, Blanche Leddra, Mary Harper (Inner), Joan Teverson (End), Michael Harper and Helen Norman (Inner), Robin and Rosemary Teverson (End)

My Grandfather, Thomas Leddra, was in a Plymouth shipping firm but I have no idea of its name.

My Father, Morris Leddra, was in the Merchant Navy as an engineer. He transferred to the Royal Navy in 1939 and was a Lieutenant Commander. His ship, Jervis Bay, was sunk in the Atlantic in 1940.

Rock Cottage: Owned by my Aunt, Nellie Chapman.

Cypress Cottage (Smuggler's Cottage): Owned by my Aunt, Nellie Chapman and my Uncle, Rear Admiral Hubert Chapman.

Rose Cottage (next to Rock Cottage): Owned by my Grandmother, Elizabeth Leddra and then, my Uncle Ralph Leddra. When my Grandmother owned it, before the war, my Uncle Claude and his family spent the summer holidays there.

Rose Cottage (near Lower Manor Farm): Bought by my Unice Claude Leddra, after the war but he did not live there. He was a Naval Constructor.



Times they are a changing (from Brian McCabe)

We were born before television, before penicillin, before frozen foods, before . . . Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, frisbees and the Pill. We were born before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball-point pens; before dishwashers, tumbledriers, electric blankets, air-conditioning, drip-dry clothes and before man walked on the moon

We married first and then lived together (how quaint). WE thought 'fast food' was what you ate at Lent; a Big Mac was an oversized raincoat; 'knocking-off' usually meant the end of the working day and 'crumpet' was what we had for tea. We existed before househusbands, computer dating, dual careers and when a 'meaningful relationship' meant getting along with the in-laws. Sheltered accommodation was protection from air-raids.

We were born before day centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We had never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors and yoghurt. For us 'time sharing' meant togetherness; a 'chip' was a piece of wood or fried potato; 'hardware meant nuts and bolts and 'software' wasn't a word.

Before 1940, 'made in japan' meant junk; 'making out' referred to how well you did in your exams, a stud was something that fastened your collar and 'going all the way' meant staying on the bus all the way to the terminus.

Pizzas, MacDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. Cigarette smoking was fashionable, 'grass' was mown, 'coke' was kept in the coalhouse, a 'joint' was the Sunday lunch and 'pot' was what it was cooked in. The sun was good for you; Rock music was grandma's lullaby and everyone could be gay.

Thanks Brian. Is this a lament to the passing of time or just an interesting reminder of how things change through technical/ medical advancement, ignorance, contrivance and social evolution. Was 'I need my space, man' first uttered by a spacewoman?
