Well, that was a chilly start to the year. On some of the days we found our team confined to our workshop in Kingston. Driving through the farm yard and the roads out into Kingston was treacherous but once we were back out it was full steam ahead.



With this cold snap we had to make sure that our population of Cirl buntings were managing to find food. Cirl buntings are quite rare in the UK and can only be found along the south Devon coast.

In these extreme cold temperatures we gave them a helping hand by spreading bird seed. The seed is supplied by the RSPB, who like us, want to ensure the birds have enough to eat. Why not take a walk along

the coast path around Wembury Point and keep an eye out for these special little birds?

Along with the birds we needed to check all our herds of ponies had water available. With the help from some local volunteers, we were able to regularly go out and brake the ice in the troughs. We also found a burst pipe in the bowser (a large plastic water store which sources a trough) at Wembury Point which we were able to quickly fix. All in all we managed to come out of the cold snap relatively unscathed.
